FREE MEALS FOR STUDENTS

Here'swhere they can get a free lunch in Wayne and Holmes counties

Staff Writer WOOSTER? Second-grader Emery Kallio and her fourth-grade brother, Jack, skipped toward the bus waiting at the entrance to Parkview Elementary on Wednesday morning. They stepped up to the door, quickly chatted with the bus driver and volunteers, then walked off, bagged meals in their hands and wide grins on their faces.

"Did you remember to say thank you?" their mother, Melanie Jones, asked.

"Thank you!" they yelled back in unison.

Parkview is one of 15 meal locations throughout Wooster where students can pick up meals during the school closure that Gov. Mike DeWine called for last week, a step taken across the state to curb the spread of the coronavirus. Wooster City Schools is distributing breakfast and lunch Monday through Friday, and buses are staying at each location for 15 to 20 minutes. The district is able to do so thanks to funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Summer Lunch Program, a federal grant initiative.

"I think this is really important because there

are so many families who don't have the opportunity to get a healthy lunch," Jones said. "Parents might be working, so kids who are old enough can come here on their own. I happened to be off [work] today, so I thought, 'Let's go for a bike ride and get some exercise." When Jones is at work, her kids are normally in school. Now, Emery and Jack are staying with their older sister, Corinne Kallio, a student at Wooster High School. Jones said her kids will likely stop by a few more times this week when she's not able to cook for them while working.

The district distributed about 350 meals Tuesday, and about another 350 Wednesday, Superintendent Michael Tefs said.

"We are expecting the number to grow each day as our families become aware of our systems for distribution," he added.

Brad Veres, a bus driver for the district, said he delivered meals to two other locations? Melrose Elementary and Brown Hollow Apartments? on Tuesday, and he and volunteers gave out about 25 meals. Breakfast contained a breakfast bar, juice and milk, while lunch featured a sandwich,

carrot sticks and an apple. Veres said it varies depending on the day.

"It feels good to get out and help where I can," he said.

Nearly 50% of students in the district rely on school breakfast and lunch, Don Lewis, food service supervisor, said in an email sent by the district earlier this week.

Susan Battig, a specialized paraprofessional at the high school, was on the bus with Veres, handing out meals.

"I'm happy that I'm doing something for our students and families in the area that need this," she said, adding that it was nice to see one of her students stop by, even though she is trying to keep a safe distance from the students to avoid the spread of germs.

Some parents, like Cassidy Cooper, stopped by without their kids to quickly grab meals and take them home.

Cooper, father to an infant, kindergartener and two fifth-graders who were at home with his wife, said it was "pretty impressive that the district is going the extra mile" to provide meals, though he added that transitioning to online schoolwork has been difficult with only one device for his kids to share.

"Especially doing math," he said. "We haven't been in school in 30 years, so we're having to learn it all over and it's actually quite different than it was when we were kids. There's a lot we're trying to work around with getting schoolwork done, still trying to maintain a household and everything else like we normally would. It's putting a lot of pressure on parents, and I'm sure the teachers are very stressed as well."

Cooper, who said he works for Woosh Delivery, isn't going to work right now. He's worried about the possibility that the school closure may be extended, especially because his wife is having heart surgery this week and he doesn't consider himself tech-savvy.

In the email sent to the Wooster City Schools community, Tefs thanked the district's transportation and food services departments for their commitment during this time.

"Between the USDA, our local faith-based partners and service organizations, we are extremely confident that our students and their families will be well cared for while schools are closed for the coronavirus," he said. "Not surprisingly, the response and support of our Wooster community has been overwhelming and heartwarming."
